#### **PROJECT TIMELINE**

CDOT has initiated a Phase I study of the Ogden Avenue Corridor Improvements Project in collaboration with the Illinois Department of Transportation, as Ogden Avenue is a state route. This includes community visioning, design development, preliminary engineering, and environmental clearances. The public will be engaged at every stage of the process. Phase II of the project will be the Detailed Design, during which final engineering plans are developed, followed by construction.





### **PROJECT OVERVIEW**

The City of Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) has kicked off a new project to revitalize Ogden Avenue, from Pulaski Road to Roosevelt Road, within the North Lawndale community.

The Ogden Avenue Corridor Improvements Project is an opportunity to reimagine Ogden Avenue as a **multimodal transportation corridor**, as a hub for **community activity**, and as a catalyst for **economic development**. The goals of the project are to improve safety for all users of this corridor, repurpose and activate public spaces, and transform this corridor into one that reflects the unique identity of North Lawndale.

Potential improvements include roadway geometry and intersection improvements; full width resurfacing; drainage improvements; new sidewalk, curb, and gutter; pedestrian safety improvements, ADA ramps and crosswalk upgrades; curb extensions, bike facilities; repurposing of service drives; street lighting; traffic signal upgrades; pavement markings and signage; paver parkways; side street improvements to the alleys; site furniture and seating areas; community identifiers including light pole and neighborhood gateway; and street trees and landscaping.
